Member Spotlight Susan Gobbo

Susan Gobbo's work, since her arrival here in St. Louis in 2008, has been focused on transcultural connection, especially for women, who, like Brazilian Susan, have found themselves landing here isolated, anxious, and lost. For Susan and many of her peers transplanted from around the world, the dream of living abroad became a nightmare. Often, like Susan, they accompanied husbands, who found work opportunities in businesses and universities here, but knew little or no English, few American behavioral norms, and certainly not the idioms and nuances of small talk and humor. And some, like Susan, because of visa restrictions and despite their experience, could not work in their fields— she was an advanced physical therapy practitioner (an ICU Coordinator) in Sao Paulo. During the day husbands left for work and children for



school, leaving some wives empty and lonely. Susan describes that period as "limbo" when she lost her identity as a highly educated professional woman, the author of a specialized clinical text on the practice of PT in the cardiac intensive care unit. (She has since written a second, as well as contributing to American anthologies about women who have met significant challenges and transformed their lives.)

As an active extravert what Susan, above all, could not tolerate was helpless resignation to her plight. By the time she and her husband Mauricio finally received their green cards (permanent residency) in 2012, she had studied Spanish and French through the St. Louis Community College and began talking with other ex-patriate women struggling with culture shock. Susan wrote a paper that landed in the hands of St. Louis Mosaic Project Executive director, Betsy Cohen. Since Mosaic aims to welcome and support immigrants to St. Louis, the two women recognized their common passion. From Mosaic Susan received support and sponsorship to manage the St. Louis International Spouses' Meetup Group, now a community of 600 women, aged 21 to 55, from 80 nations— "from Argentina to Zimbabwe." Susan beams as she describes the tours, arts events, picnics, and dinners, featuring foods from home countries. The women feel seen and heard, fully recognized. "After all, we all have our accents. We all make mistakes as we face the same hurdles. We all need a safe place to practice [new words, new habits.... Now] I can bring the help I wish I'd had when I arrived."

While the Meetup grew and prospered, other projects arose, such as the International Mentoring Program, co-founded by Susan and Annie Schlafly. The Mentoring Program pairs new arrivals with local women, who, in providing help with the basics—where things are and how they're done—open themselves to a larger vision of customs, mores, and tastes. Vistas expand along with a larger sense of family and community.

Susan and Mauricio's daughter, Laura, was five when they arrived in the US, she—and her parents—grew up in this organic synthesis of cultures. When Susan began teaching Portuguese at St. Louis Community College at Meramec, Laura volunteered as a tutor; she attended celebratory events through a Brazilian organization then formed an international students' group at her own high school. Mauricio, who is an IT Program Manager at Nestle Purina, has joined Susan as a Mosaic Ambassador and on the Board of Directors of the Hispanic Leaders Group of Greater St. Louis, contributing to the vibrancy of the regional Latino community

This intense, enlivening multicultural involvement Susan sees as a link to her origins in a small town in southwestern Brazil, where a surprising number of internationals lived. Susan's godmother came from India and her paternal grandmother from Italy— "I still talk with my hands." Mauricio's grandparents also emigrated from Italy, and he has worked for many years for transnational corporations, first Unilever and InBev in Brazil, then Nestle Purina in the US. ("Free beer then free baby food.") So many ties and exchanges as Susan seeks members and feeds volunteers from her groups to local museums, festivals, and both non-profit and corporate institutions. Warm circles.
