

Rebecca Copeland is a professor of modern Japanese literature, a writer of fiction and literary criticism, and a translator. Her research focuses almost exclusively on modern Japanese women writers, examining the way their gender has defined and often confined their literary production. In the classroom, she offers a diverse range of courses, from postwar fiction and women writers to translation, mythic monsters, and mystery fiction. Her creative writing travels between Japan and the American South and touches on questions of identity,

belonging, and self-discovery. The Kimono Tattoo (2021), her debut novel, takes readers on a journey into Kyoto's intricate world of kimono design, and into a mystery that interweaves family dynamics, loss, and reconciliation.

Osaka, Japan | Kyoto

Arrive at Kansai International Airport or Osaka Itami International Airport.
Transfer to Kyoto and check in to the first-class Kyoto Hotel Okura. Spend your evening at leisure and make your own plans for dinner.

Day 3 | April 27

Kyoto

Visit two UNESCO-inscribed Zen Buddhist temples today. Ryoan-ji, established in 1450, features a world-famous rock garden. Kinkaku-ji, the Golden Pavilion, is a visual feast, boasting two stories covered in gold leaf. This evening, join your fellow travelers for a Welcome Reception, followed by dinner on your own.

Day 4 | April 28

Kyoto

Kiyomizu-dera looks over the city from its perch in the eastern hills. After touring the temple, walk through the surrounding charming neighborhood, where the streets are lined with shops and restaurants.

Day 5 | April 29 B-L-R-D

Noh drama — often involving

Day 6 | April 30 B-L-D

Miyajima | Hiroshima

Walk to one of Japan's most iconic sites, the

Itsukushima Shrine. The imposing vermilion Torii gate appears to float above the Seto Inland Sea. At Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park, learn about the events of August 6, 1945, when the U.S. dropped an atomic bomb during WWII. See the iconic domed Peace Memorial — the only building that withstood the blast — and talk with the family member of a Hiroshima survivor.





Day 7 | May 1

B-L-D

Hagi

Explore UNESCO-inscribed Hagi, a well-preserved castle town. Stop at Toko-ji, a complex of Zen Buddhist temples in a forested compound. Continue to Kikuya-ke and tour the traditional home and beautiful grounds. At the Hagi Uragami Museum, marvel at the impressive collection of woodblock prints by master artists Hokusai and Hiroshige.

Day 8 | May 2

B-L-D

Sakaiminato | Matsue

Visit the Adachi Museum, with its large collection of 20th-century art and award-winning garden.

See Matsue-jo, often called the "black castle" for its dark-tiled roof and dark exterior.

Day 9 | May 3

B-L-D

Ulsan South Korea

Visit the UNESCO-inscribed Gyeongju Historic Areas — comprised of pagodas, sculptures, tumuli and ruins of temples and palaces. During your excursion, stop in Bulguksa Temple, the center of Korea's Buddhist culture. Tour the Gyeongju National Museum, with precious archaeological artifacts, including gold jewelry, pottery, art and more. Stop for lunch, where you'll enjoy a performance of traditional music and dance.

Finally, visit a fifth-century tomb and discover its many artifacts.

Day 10 | May 4

Nagasaki, Japan

This historic port city is an important international trade hub set on a natural harbor at the base of rolling mountains. Like Hiroshima, its name is synonymous with the atomic bombing that took place here in 1945. Today, choose between two included excursions: visit the Museum of History & Culture and Peace Park and learn its fascinating story. Or tour the Atomic Bomb Museum. This museum covers the bombing as a story, with exhibits





reconstructing the events leading up to and following the explosion. See the nearby Peace Park and Oura Cathedral as well. Both excursions finish with a visit to lovely Glover Garden. As you tour the mountainside grounds, take in scenic views of the harbor below.

Day 11 | May 5

B-L-D

Fukuoka

Japan's sixth-largest city, Fukuoka, is known as Japan's ramen capital and with an abundance of fresh seafood, supports a vibrant foodie culture. Explore Dazaifu Tenmangu, a famous shrine that is home to over 6,000 plum trees. Pass through the Tori gate and stroll two lovely arched bridges to cross a pond, built in the shape of the Japanese character for a heart, before arriving at the shrine itself. Continue to the Kyushu National Museum, which aims to examine Japan through an Asian point of view.

Day 12 | May 6

Uno Ko

Stroll through the charming Bikan District — the old merchant quarter, where white-walled homes, shops and storehouses preserve the ambiance of an important trading port. Visit the tranquil Koraku-en garden, an iconic




retreat dating from the late 1600s. This lovely green space is recognized throughout Japan as one of the top three parks in the country. Join your fellow passengers this evening for a Farewell Reception and Dinner.

Day 13 | May 7

Osaka | Disembark | Return to Home City After breakfast, disembark the ship in Osaka and transfer to the airport for your flight home.

Pico lyer was born in Oxford, England. He won a King's Scholarship to Eton and then a Demyship to Magdalen College, Oxford, where he was awarded a Congratulatory Double First with the highest marks of any English Literature student in the university. He became a Teaching Fellow at Harvard, where he received a second master's degree. He holds an honorary doctorate in Humane Letters. lyer has been a full-time writer since 1982, publishing 15 books, translated into 23 languages, including "A Beginner's Guide to Japan" and "The Half Known Life." He has also written the introductions to more than 70 other books, 100 newspaper and magazine articles a year, a screenplay and a libretto.

Since 1992 lyer has spent much of his time at a Benedictine hermitage in Big Sur, California, and most of the rest in suburban Japan.
