## Member Spotlight

## Ingrid Neuefeind A Lifetime of Experience

After the pleasure of walking through Ingrid Neuefeind's lush green front yard, I found myself enchanted by the light and color I encountered when she opened the front door. Ingrid greeted me warmly in a simple multi-colored dress then escorted me to the living room, shining from sunlit stained glass, bright artwork, an eight-foot-high flower sculpture wreathed in Christmas lights, and, from the rear, a view of her lively garden and her husband Wilhelm's "junk art": glass bottle mobiles and fluttering fabric streamers. So much and so simple. Lively aesthetics in color and pattern—and sound I was soon to learn—characterize 87-year-old Ingrid and the life she and her husband have made here in St. Louis.

The couple and their two young daughters, Nicole and Bettina, moved to their home in the heart of University City shortly after their arrival in the US more than forty years ago when Wilhelm was hired to teach theoretical economics at WashU. The girls adapted quickly to American culture and language in the U. City public schools, and Ingrid soon acquired the coursework necessary for K-12 teaching certification to teach German and music, but she was lonely and missed the "carnival city" in Germany—Cologne—where she grew up and met her husband after completion of their studies. In addition to the Woman's Club, which she joined around 1978, music proved the key to belonging.

Ingrid was then and is a violinist. Teaching and performing music connect her via the shared riches of melody and devotion to skill-development and the mesmerizing communication of temporal beauty among adult companions. When she became part of

the St. Louis Philharmonic and helped form a string quartet, she was relieved not to "be so alone anymore"; she and the other musicians speak a common language. She has played with the Philharmonic as it has moved from what was Kiel Auditorium (on the other side of a wall from where basketball fans shrieked) to Logan University, where this summer they will perform their semi-annual Pops concert. Her involvement in music organizations has not been limited to her teaching and performance, however; for example, in the past she designed posters for the Philharmonic, publicized concerts, and served on its board; she currently serves on the advisory board for the Webster Music School and was a docent for the St. Louis Symphony and still is for Opera Theatre Saint Louis. And, of course, "my husband and I attend thirty + concerts a year," every kind of music in every sort of venue. Not surprisingly, one of Ingrid's first efforts in the Woman's Club was to co-found the Classical Music interest group which quickly evolved from just listening to supporting one another as performers.

All the while Ingrid and Wilhelm pursued their careers and raised their daughters, they deepened their commitments to the neighborhood and larger community. Both tutored for Oasis, Ingrid for fifteen years, Wilhelm for ten. She served as the Woman's Club's president TWICE—1993-94 and 2007-08—organizing many visits to St. Louis cultural institutions. In that household their daughters grew into accomplished, engaged

women: The elder, Nicole, studied design at Stanford then earned her MBA at the Northwestern University; she and her husband, an architect, live in Barcelona, where she designs customer satisfaction programs for Oracle. Bettina graduated from WashU and got a law degree from the University of Chicago. She and her husband, a constitutional law professor, both work for Harvard, where she advocates for disabled children seeking educational services to which they are entitled. Ingrid loves their three children, aged 15, 18, and 21.

Unlike the cultural and civic wealth and safety that undergirded much of her daughters' childhoods, Ingrid was born and spent her first years in Breslau, Germany (Silesia) —now Wroclaw, Poland—during the ravages of WWII then the immediate marauding Soviet invasion. She remembers, first, being crowded into freight cars, then walking west, exhausted and cold, during a long winter, seeking refuge from the Russians. She made a point, when her daughters came along, of introducing them to Breslau/Wroclaw, their ancestral home.

Now many years and experiences later Ingrid acknowledges that she and Wilhelm are old—though not as old as her mother, who, despite the hardships of surviving the war, the occupation, and separation from her family in the East, lived to be 102. Ingrid is saddened at times by the losses associated with aging and laments such frustrations as arthritic hands, but she and Wilhelm remain vibrantly active: He bikes several times per week and meets with fellow cyclists on Sundays, and she, of course, plays her violin. A book of flower photographs she took at the Missouri Botanical Garden fairly vibrates with brilliant hues, making clear that she is still in love with color. 
