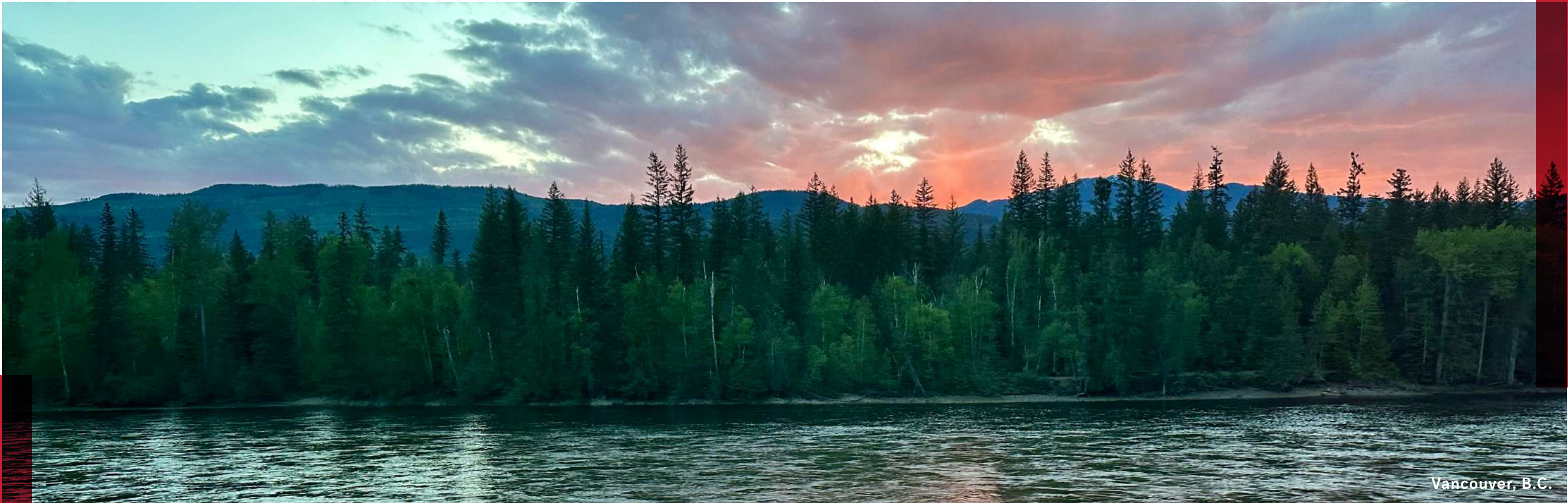

SAN JUAN ISLANDS

JULY 19–24, 2027

Visit remote shores such as Sucia Island and enjoy sweeping views from Mount Constitution and Lime Kiln State Park, one of the world’s premier land-based whale-watching sites.



EXPLORING ICELAND

AUGUST 5–15, 2027

Discover a land shaped by fire and ice, where glaciers carve valleys and steam rises from geothermal fields. Iceland’s dramatic landscapes – waterfalls, black-sand beaches, volcanic plains, and rugged coastlines – offer a sense of true remoteness. AUGUST 26-SEPTEMBER 1, 2027

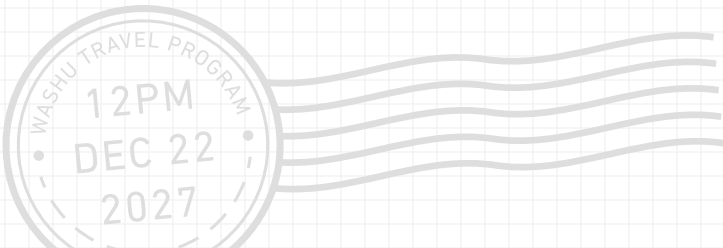

TRAVELTIPS

Successful travel is shaped by preparation and curiosity. Beyond packing efficiently, the most rewarding journeys come from being attentive, flexible, and open to the unexpected. In this section, we offer tips to guide your planning. While tour operators typically provide detailed guidance in pre-trip materials or meetings, don't hesitate to reach out to them if you have any additional questions or need clarification.

SMART PACKING & GEAR

Choose versatile, high-quality items that do double duty:

Scarf: provides warmth, shade, or even a picnic blanket.

Jacket: layers for comfort and can dress up an evening outing.

Poncho/Raincoat: protects from the elements without adding bulk or needing an umbrella.

Tech Essentials: noise-canceling headphones, portable chargers, and e-readers keep you prepared for long flights, remote excursions, or quiet moments of reflection.

Multi-Purpose Footwear: comfortable for walking and stylish for evenings.

Packing Cubes: organize luggage and maximize space.

Reusable Water Bottle: stay hydrated and reduce plastic waste.

Portable First Aid Kit: essential items for peace of mind.

Ziploc Bags: protect electronics or store snacks.

TECHNOLOGY TIPS

A bit of advance planning can make technology seamless during your travels:

International Voltage Differences: most devices are dual voltage, but check if you need a converter for items like hair dryers. Don't forget a plug adapter for different outlets.

Data Plans: consider an international plan or confirm roaming options with your carrier before you travel.

Group Communication: use apps like WhatsApp to stay in touch with your group; download and familiarize yourself with them ahead of time.

Photo Sharing: create shared albums with Google Photos or Apple Photos, or try PhotoCircle and Cluster for easy sharing.

Offline Maps: download maps for offline use with apps like Google Maps or Maps.me for areas with limited service.

Backup Important Documents: store digital copies of passports and travel insurance in a secure cloud service or USB drive.

Battery Backup: carry a high-capacity portable charger to keep devices powered during long days out.

Security Apps: enable tracking apps for lost devices and use two-factor authentication for added security.

Language Translation Apps: download apps like Google Translate for offline use to assist with communication.

Travel-Friendly Apps: research and install destination-specific apps for local insights, guides, or transport options.

JOURNEY ENRICHMENT

Smart Accessories: field guides, sketchbooks, binoculars, or compact journals can deepen your engagement with a place.

Local Language: learning a few common phrases in the local language can make interactions smoother and more rewarding.

Local Currency: while most larger establishments accept credit cards, having some local cash on hand is helpful for smaller transactions at markets or with street vendors.

DESTINATION-SPECIFIC INSIGHT

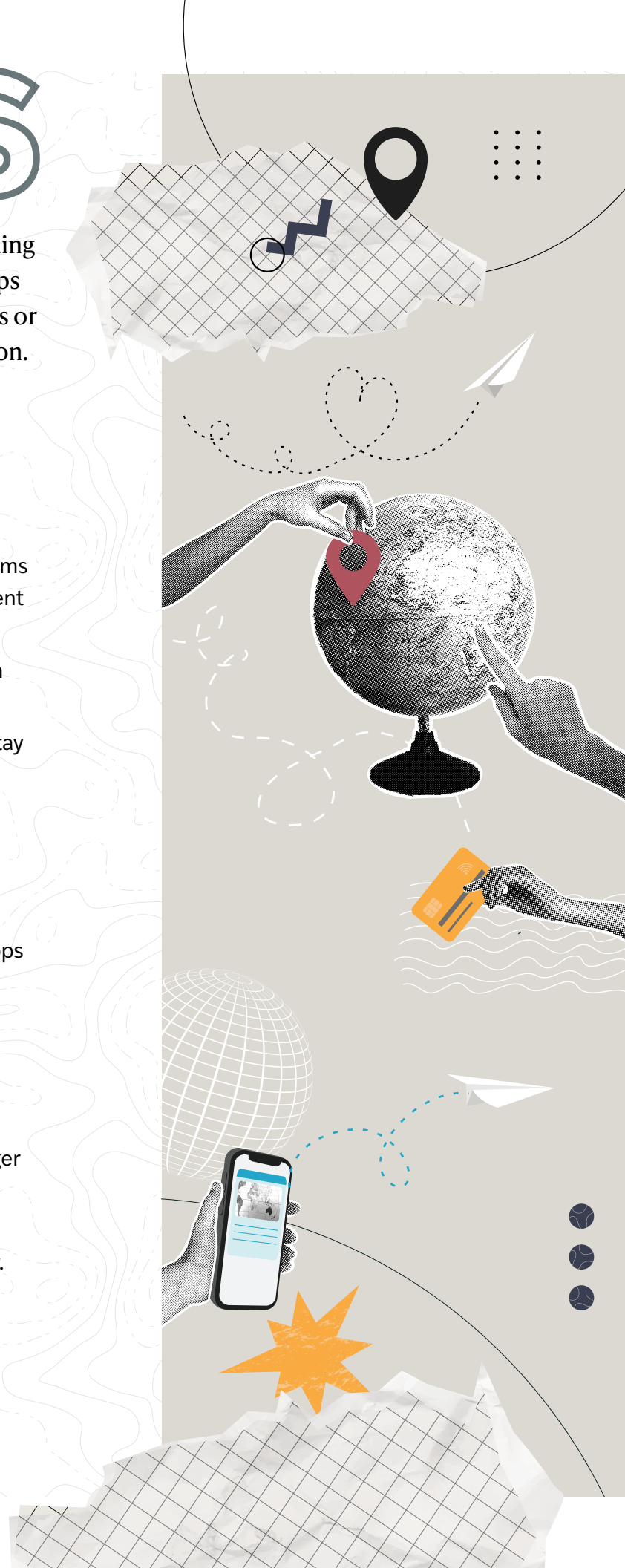
Seasoned travelers know the value of small details. For example, in Japan, quiet socks are appreciated at temples, while in Norway, layers are essential for rapidly shifting fjord weather. Each trip comes with thorough pre-departure documentation from our tour operators, outlining everything you need to know — from what to bring to handling money and packing strategies. Preparing for each destination's quirks ensures a seamless and immersive experience.

COMMON PITFALLS FOR EXPERIENCED TRAVELERS

Even on thoughtfully-designed itineraries, it's important to check in with yourself. Travel can be exhilarating but demanding, so it's okay to skip an excursion if you're not feeling up for it. Listen to your body, pace yourself, and prioritize rest to stay healthy and energized throughout your journey. Remember to keep maps and data accessible offline, and be aware that each region has its own customs and local expectations.

TRAVEL PREP & CULTURAL INTELLIGENCE

Reading, podcasts, or short guides can provide context that transforms sightseeing into understanding. Learning key phrases, asking thoughtful questions of guides, and engaging with local artisans adds depth and meaning to your experiences. Mindful choices — such as sustainable travel and ethical encounters — help ensure that exploration benefits both the traveler and the community.





EGYPT AND THE ETERNAL NILE

This past February, a group of Washington University alumni and friends embarked on an extraordinary educational journey through ancient Egypt as part of the “Egypt and the Eternal Nile” travel program, organized by University Advancement. The John and Penelope Biggs Department of Classics is especially delighted that Associate Professor of Classics and of Art History and Archaeology Nicola Aravecchia served as the scholarly host for the tour.

PROFESSOR ARAVECCHIA’S EXPERTISE ENRICHES THE EXPERIENCE

Throughout the trip, Professor Nicola Aravecchia provided participants with rich historical, archaeological, and cultural context, transforming each visit into a dynamic learning experience. Renowned for his work in late antique archaeology and the study of early

Christian communities in Egypt, Aravecchia offered travelers a deeper understanding of the ancient sites they encountered, highlighting connections between Egyptian, Greek, and Roman traditions.

His presence added an invaluable academic dimension to the journey, complementing the insights of the group’s expert Egyptian guide and creating a rare combination of local knowledge and classical scholarship.

A JOURNEY THROUGH THE HEART OF ANCIENT CIVILIZATION

Beginning in Cairo, the group explored the Great Pyramids and other iconic monuments before traveling south to Abu Simbel. The itinerary included a serene cruise on Lake Nasser, followed by a classic voyage along the

Lower Nile from Aswan to Luxor, visiting storied temples, ancient tombs, and beautifully preserved archaeological sites along the way. At each destination, Professor Aravecchia provided historical framing, discussions of art and architecture, and opportunities for participants to engage in rich conversations about the ancient world.

A HIGHLIGHT: THE ROMAN-ERA TEMPLE OF KALABSHA

One of the most memorable stops was the visit to the Temple of Kalabsha, located near Aswan. Built during the reign of Emperor Augustus, the site embodies the fascinating interactions between Roman authority and Egyptian religious traditions – making it an especially meaningful stop for our Classics community.

CELEBRATING LEARNING AND COMMUNITY
The Department of Classics is proud to see its faculty contributing to University Advancement’s alumni and friends travel programming. Professor Aravecchia’s involvement exemplifies the department’s commitment to sharing classical and archaeological scholarship beyond the classroom – bringing the ancient world to life for our broader WashU community.

We extend our thanks to University Advancement for organizing this remarkable program and to the many alumni and friends whose enthusiasm is making the journey so memorable. The travel program will return to Egypt in 2027 and regularly offers educational tours to Greece, Italy, and other centers of the classical world.



FAQs

HOW DO I REGISTER FOR A TRIP?

If you would like to reserve a space on a trip, please contact the tour operator directly. Contact information is available on our website on the [Travel Partner](#) page and on the individual trip detail pages. If you subscribe to our mailing list, you will also find contact information printed on the paper brochures you receive in the mail. Deposits can be made by check or credit card and are required at the time of reservation. Some travel companies will offer a discount if you pay in full upfront. Space is not guaranteed.

DO I HAVE TO BE A WASHU ALUM TO PARTICIPATE IN THE TRAVEL PROGRAM?

WashU affiliations are an important part of our program, but you do not have to be an alum to travel with us. We welcome alumni, parents, families, and friends of students and graduates who are interested in participating in educational travel experiences with WashU.

ARE SINGLE ROOMS AVAILABLE?

Many trips will charge a single supplement for those who wish to room alone. On most tours, a limited number of single rooms are available. Single travelers can request to be matched with a roommate to reduce the cost and the tour operator will strive to find a compatible partner to share a room. On a few select tours offered by our tour operators, a single supplement fee is not required.

WHAT ARE THE PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS FOR A TRIP?

To enjoy the travel experience, participants should be in good physical and mental health and feel comfortable keeping pace with a group. All tours require a certain degree of physical activity, such as walking and getting on and off ships, planes, buses, or other vehicles. Activity levels will vary based on the destination and itinerary. Extreme variations in altitude, temperature, and humidity should be considered when traveling in certain parts of the world and many excursions will involve walking on uneven terrain (e.g., cobblestone streets, hiking trails). Program participants who need special assistance and/or equipment must be accompanied by someone who can provide the required assistance. We recommend that you review the details on the trip website and contact the travel company directly if you have specific concerns or questions about the level of activity involved.

WHO WILL BE ON THE TOUR?

WashU often shares tours with other universities and organizations that have education-oriented travel programs. This is most common on cruises that can accommodate large numbers of guests. Typically, land-based tours are smaller, with a maximum capacity between 12-30 guests, depending on the tour operator and destination. On these smaller trips, tour operators give us a window of time to offer the trip exclusively to WashU travelers. If we are

unable to book all the seats, the tour operator will open the tour up to another institution.

DO WASHU FACULTY MEMBERS GO ON THE TRIPS?

Each year, several of our trips feature university faculty members who accompany the tour and share their expertise and insights. Faculty participation is listed in the summary-level details for the trip on the [Upcoming Destinations](#) page. We can only send a faculty member if a minimum number of WashU travelers sign up for a trip. The minimum requirement varies by destination and tour operator.

HOW ARE TRIPS PRICED?

All tour prices listed are per person, based on double occupancy, current exchange rates, and tariffs at the time the tours are arranged. Single occupancy is available on a limited basis for each program at a supplemental charge (unless otherwise noted). Dates, prices, itineraries, and program details are subject to change and revision, but every effort will be made to conduct the tour program as planned and advertised.

WHAT DOES THE PRICE OF THE TRIP INCLUDE?

The listed price is the starting price per person based on double occupancy. Trips typically include lodging, local transfers to and from the airport and other destinations on the tour, baggage handling, most meals, and sightseeing as specified in the brochure and on the trip

details website. Trips do not include passport and visa fees, some gratuities, or personal travel insurance. Airfare varies by program, so please contact the travel company for more information. All pre- and post-trip extensions are offered at an additional charge.

IS AIRFARE INCLUDED AND IF NOT, HOW DO AIRLINE ARRANGEMENTS WORK?

Some tours include airfare. If not, most of our tour operators offer an option to purchase airfare from various cities at an additional cost. You may also make your own arrangements with a preferred airline. If you choose to schedule your own flights, you will be responsible for arranging your own round-trip ground transportation between the destination airport and the hotel. If airfare is included, routings are at the discretion of the tour operator and are based on flight availability and agreements among the air carriers and the tour operator. All special flight requests (specified carriers, routings, and departure/arrival times) may be subject to a deviation fee. Airline flights may not be eligible for upgrades with frequent

flyer miles, and mileage credit may not be applicable with fares. Please contact the tour operator directly for more information on airfare options.

WHAT IS THE CANCELLATION POLICY?

Cancellation policies vary according to individual tour operator's policies. Cancellation penalties go into effect after the tour operator has received the deposit, and fees increase as you get closer to the departure date. Please read the terms and conditions for your specific tour and contact the tour operator for more information.

IS TRAVEL SAFE?

The WashU Travel Program and each of our tour operators consider the safety of our travelers to be a top priority. We recommend visiting the [U.S. Department of State's Travel Resources](#) website for up-to-date information on travel advisories, passport processing, pre-trip checklists, overseas emergency protocols, and more.

SHOULD I PURCHASE TRAVEL INSURANCE?

We strongly encourage all travelers to purchase trip protection. Travel insurance offers a reasonably priced and convenient way to safeguard your investment in case of unforeseen events before or during your journey. We recommend purchasing insurance for both international and domestic trips.

As a service to our travelers, the travel program has partnered with Meyer and Associates to offer various travel protection plans. Insurance is not required but highly recommended, and you are welcome to use any company you like. If you are interested in learning more about the plans Meyer and Associates offers, please visit [Travel Insurance Options](#) on our website. If you have questions about the plans or coverage, please call them directly at 866-679-7836 to speak to a licensed professional.

Please note that certain insurance features, such as "cancel for any reason" (CFAR) coverage and pre-existing condition waivers, must be purchased within a specific window of time, typically 10-21 days from the date on your welcome letter. The travel program will send your official trip registration welcome letter to the email address you provide the tour operator when signing up for the trip. If you choose to work with Meyer and Associates, you will need that letter to purchase time-sensitive coverage. One of their licensed professionals can provide more details on these offerings.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR OR RENEW A PASSPORT?

The [U.S. Department of State](#) has detailed information on how to apply for/renew a passport.

DO TRIPS SELL OUT?

Yes. We have a limited number of spots for each program. If a trip is sold out, you can ask the travel company to be added to the waitlist. In some cases, an additional departure date may be added to accommodate high demand.

HOW CAN I GET INFORMATION ABOUT UPCOMING TRIPS?
